We had a great time at our 80th Annual Meeting and Musical Theatre Competition in Champaign-Urbana in May. It was so good to see everyone! And something special for me happened there–I was elected your national president for 2024-2026 and I am so happy to serve, both our members and the young artists we support.

President Mary Ann Osborne presided and conducted our business during the general session. We met Paul Wigley, the president of the newly formed Central Iowa Chapter. We learned our budgetary outlook is brighter. And, we are starting three new initiatives. Hurrah!

• First is the Morgan-Lee/Peery Art Scholarship which will mirror the Career Opportunity Awards that we have available for past annual award winners. We will ask past Winston 2-D Art scholarship winners to apply for funds.

• Second is the National Society of Arts and Letters Writing Scholarship. This scholarship will be like the Winston scholarships, reaching out to writers from the ages of 16 to not yet 23. Brennen Edwards, a new member of the Indiana Chapter, will be the national chair. She has won three NSAL awards from the Indiana Chapter for her playwriting. Brochures will be sent out later this summer.

• Third, Judy Martorelli announced the Martorelli Classical Voice Scholarship. More on page 3.

NSAL continues to move forward into the age of technology. Online registration for the annual meeting was used for the first time this year. It will be simplified for next year, allowing you to choose your meal entrees and to report any food allergies, etc. Our Executive Committee, Board of Directors and Board of Trustees met via Zoom during the month preceding the annual meeting. And the Winners Are...

Thirteen outstanding musical theatre performers gathered in Champaign-Urbana, Illinois, on May 15 and 16 for the National Society of Arts and Letters 80th Annual Meeting and Musical Theatre Competition. They came from as far away as Hawaii and as close as Illinois.

On Thursday, May 16, the finalists were taken to the Tryon Festival Theatre at the Krannert Center for the Performing Arts. They drew numbers for the order in which they would perform. They took to the stage and got a feel for the space. They also met with the accompanist, Carl Pantle, master's candidate in vocal accompanying and coaching at the University of Illinois. Carl already had their music but they were able to run through it with him.

Performances began Friday morning, May

17. The morning was devoted to the finalists' two songs and one monologue and the afternoon featured the dance class, led by Krisha Marcano, one of the judges.

The excitement and suspense continued until Saturday evening when the six winners were announced at the final banquet.

The winners are:

First place, the National Society of Arts & Letters Award, Albert Sterner, Illinois Chapter, \$15,000. Second place, the Derek Oppen Award, Christian Clausnitzer, Ohio River Valley Chapter, \$12,000. Third place, the Edith Bauman Award, Parnassus Funk, St. Louis Chapter, \$8,000. Fourth place, the Bill Thunhurst Award, Allison Dorsey, Pittsburgh Chapter, \$5,000. Fifth place, the Mary Jane Cultra Award, Jose Andres Uribe Garza, Arizona Chapter, \$3,000. Honorable mention, Anne and Sam Martorelli Award, Rachel Oppmann, Alabama Chapter, \$2,000. The top three winners, Albert, Christian, and Parnassus, performed again at the banquet.

The four judges:



• Aisha Jackson made her Broadway debut in *Beautiful: The Carole King Musical.* She's gone on to be in the original Broadway casts of *Once Upon a One More Time, Paradise Square, Waitress,* and *Frozen.*

• Joe Deer is an award-winning director and choreographer of more than 200 productions-from Off-Broadway, London, regional, summer stock and university stages. He is former Chair and Artistic Director of the Department of Theatre, Dance, and Motion Pictures at Wright State University.

• Kevin Stites most recently finished a guest conductor position with the Boston Conservatory at Berklee, music directing a production of *City of Angels*. Last summer he served as curator/conductor for *Everybody Else, A Stephen Sondheim Celebration*, at the Hollywood Bowl.

• Krisha Marcano is an innovative theatre educator, choreographer, and entrepreneur with more than 30 years of experience in the performing arts. She has recently been appointed Dean of Theater at Boston Conservatory at Berklee.

Dorothy Lincoln Smith Classical Voice Winners

For eight years Dorothy Lincoln-Smith has been providing awards for classical singers from the ages of 23 to 31. These awards have picked up where the Winston Voice Scholarships left off, age wise. Dorothy's commitment of eight years at \$10,000 a year has come to an end in 2024 . Thank you, Dorothy, for your generosity

The winners for 2024 are:

- First place: Veronique Filloux, Arizona Chapter, \$5,000.
- Second place: Joseph Parrish, Washington, D.C. Chapter, \$3,000.
- Third place: Maggie Renee, Florida Chapter, \$2,000.

NSAL members were able to enjoy the incredible voice of Joseph Parrish, on tape, at the Presidents' Luncheon. Joseph is currently an artist diploma candidate in opera studies at The Julliard School.

Judges for the 2024 competition were:

- Adam Turner, Director of Virginia Opera.
- Brian DeMaris, Director of Opera at Arizona State University and Chair of the Metropolitan Auditions in Arizona.
- Jeannine Wagner, Director of Wagner Chorale, and Director of Church Music in Fillmore, California.

Judy Martorelli, second vice-president and New Jersey Chapter president, will be funding these classical voice awards for the foreseeable future. Awards of \$10,000 will be given in 2025.

Winston Classical Voice Scholarships

Judy Martorelli, national chair of the Shirley Rabb Winston Scholarship in Classical Voice, reports another successful year. A total of \$16,000 is being awarded to seven young singers, two in the 19 to 22 age group and five in the 16 to 18 age group. Fourteen chapters participated in the competition. There were 24 finalists: 18 females and six males. Each chapter is encouraged to submit two finalists.

Jordan McCready, representing the Central Iowa Chapter, received the top award and sang at the reception at the University of Illinois president's house on May 17. She received a very warm welcome and enjoyed her interactions with both members and the musical theatre finalists.

- Encouragement Awards: Caitlyn Towell, Illinois Chapter; Catherine Creed, New Jersey Chapter, and Laura Mendez, Florida Chapter. Each will receive \$1,000..

All seven chose to use their scholarships for further education-tuition, voice lessons, or summer programs. The money is not given directly to the winners. Doni Lystra, past NSAL national president, administers the Winston money and issues checks to the proper people or organizations.

- Marco Nistico is the Artistic Administrator for Sarasota Opera. He spent two decades singing baritone roles in opera houses worldwide.
- Martin Sedak is chair of the music department and Director of Music at Keio Academy of New York and was recently named Artistic Director and Conductor for the Masterwork Chorus of New Jersey.

Winston 2D Art Scholarships

Twyla Martins and Norman Brown, co-chairs of the Naomi Rabb Winston Scholarship Award in Two-Dimensional Art, announced the winners for 2024 in April. The competition was intense, Twyla said, and a total of 39 young artists entered their work, with 28 artists in the 16-18 age group and just 11 in the 19-22 age group. The \$16,000 was divided evenly between the groups but more awards were awarded in the younger group.

Top winner, Ava Elizabeth Liberace, joined NSAL members in Champaign-Urbana to present her winning artwork.
